

Devotional Spotlight

Feast of the Presentation of Our Lord in the Temple

Known originally as the Feast of the Purification of the Blessed Virgin, the Feast of the Presentation of the Lord is an ancient celebration in the Church with great significance and meaning. This feast marks the end of the Christmas/Epiphany season. We remember in a special way the humble obedience of the Holy Family to the Mosaic Law in this feast; though it is the striking prophecy of Simeon that gives a close to the celebration of Christ's birth and an introduction to the consideration of his life and death.

Simeon's prophecy of Mary's sufferings is particularly emphasized through the writings of Pope John Paul II: "Simeon's words seem like a second Annunciation to Mary, for they tell her of the actual historical situation in which the Son is to accomplish his mission, namely, in misunderstanding and sorrow." (Redemptoris Mater, n16)



In addition to this prophecy of struggle comes a great message of light. Simeon proclaims this Child will be "a light to the revelation of the Gentiles" (Luke 2:32); a light that the nations had never known before. With his words predicting great suffering to the Blessed Mother, Simeon proclaims the light of Christ will be a light for all to see with. This emphasis on light developed the custom of blessing candles on the Feast of the Presentation. The candles are lit, and often a



procession takes place through the darkened church while the Canticle of Simeon is sung. Because of this, the feast also became known as Candlemas. Let us all join in prayer and thanksgiving for the gift of the Light of Christ.

What is a pilgrimage?

A pilgrimage is a spiritual journey to visit a holy site, such as the shrine of a saint, a place where the Blessed Virgin Mary has appeared, or a historic church or chapel. What makes a pilgrimage different from a vacation and a pilgrim distinct from a tourist is the spirit in which the journey is made. Pilgrimages are really a symbol of our spiritual journey in life, reminding us that this world is not our true home and that we spend our lives journeying to our homeland, which is the Kingdom of God. Pilgrimages are also an opportunity for us to step out of the rhythms and limits of our daily lives to seek out connection with God in a special way, by visiting a holy place. In the end, pilgrimages are an ancient act of devotion and something that each of us can put into practice, helping us to discover how God is present in the world around us, in places both near and far.

People often call their homes their "sanctuary" - a secure refuge of safety and serenity. Historically, a sanctuary is known as the holiest of holy places. When entering a Catholic church, the crucifix, usually centered in the middle of the sanctuary (the area around the alter), is one of the first things we notice. We see the outstretched arms of our Savior welcoming us into His Presence. While many Catholics display a crucifix in their home, do we understand the true reasons for doing so? Or, do we simply hang a crucifix on the wall as a form of sacred art?

When your home is occupied by family members who are baptized, confirmed, consecrated through the Sacrament of Matrimony, and/ or nourished by Christ's Body and Blood through Holy Communion, it makes sense that your domestic sanctuary can also be considered a holy place. Your space should reflect your commitment to Christ's sacrificial love, and the crucifix is a prominent sign of your belief in this. The crucifix can also draw those who do not live their sacraments to begin to do so.

The crucifix is an influential symbol because it reminds us of a horrific, yet powerful reality. Although He lived sinlessly, Jesus was crucified for the sins of mankind. The Eternal Son of God became man and endured unimaginable suffering to obtain our salvation. Prominent placement of a crucifix in your home (one in each room is even better) provides a constant reminder of Jesus' supreme sacrifice for us. Welcome Jesus into your home and keep Him in the forefront of your daily, prayerful life. The Shrine Gift Shop features a diverse selection of beautiful crucifixes to adorn your living space, creating a mindful "sanctuary" for prayer and deliberate reflection. They also make wonderful gifts for your loved ones celebrating special moments such as Confirmation and First Holy Communion.



While this reminder is key, there is much more to the spiritual value of the crucifix:

- Gazing upon the crucifix is a vivid reminder that evil does not have power over us, verifying that Christ has conquered sin and death and has ultimately persevered over the clutches of evil. Displaying the crucifix is our commitment to the Lord that his Sacrifice is never forgotten.
- Highlighting a crucifix in your home serves as a visual sign to pause, pray, and reflect. It is a gentle nudge to take a moment to absorb what Jesus did for you. Prayer in front of a crucifix encourages selfexamination and contemplation of Christ.
- Only John remained with the Blessed Mother at the foot of the Jesus' cross. We should try to follow in his footsteps. The crucifix is our reminder to not run when life gets tough and to put our trivial problems aside, trusting in our Lord Jesus to guide and protect us.
- Praying in front of the crucifix emulates the practice of many Saints who focused deliberately on Christ, both in their everyday prayer, as well as when suffering. St. Catherine of Siena was known for her holiness, spiritual visions, and the belief she received the stigmata – she stared at the cross in prayer for hours each day.
- By hanging a crucifix on the wall, we are constantly reminded of the enormity of God's Love for us through the sacrifice of His only Son on a wooden cross. The crucifix is the greatest proof that God could give us of His eternal love – the most compelling motivation He could employ to obtain our hearts in return.
