




A major part of the mission of the Shrine is helping those who come as pilgrims on a spiritual journey to find our Lord Jesus through Mary. During the first 9 days of October the Shrine of Our Lady of Good Help prays a novena in thanksgiving for the apparitions and the fruitful ministry that has come as a result. These days are marked with prayer and an emphasis on the mission given to Adele by Mary through memorial services and devotions focused on teaching and spreading the faith.

Our Blessed Mother Said to Adele on October 9th, 1859, "I am the Queen of Heaven who prays for the conversion of sinners, and I wish you to do the same. You received Holy Communion this morning and that is well. But you must do more. Make a general confession and offer Communion for the conversion of sinners. If they do not convert and do penance, my Son will be obliged to punish them." These words of our Blessed Mother to Adele express the spirit and soul of the ministry of the Shrine. Under the guidance of the Queen of Heaven, the Shrine strives to provide an environment of conversion for all who visit. The Shrine of our Ladv of Good Help seeks to participate

in this mission of our Lady by the promotion and communication of the Catholic faith especially through the sacraments.

On October 8th a celebration in commemoration of the miracle of the Peshtigo fire is held in which the faithful remember Mary's special protection from the flames of that night. The holy rosary and all-night adoration help to express the profound gratitude held by so many for the care of Blessed Mother Mary. These nine days of prayer, learning, and sacrifice are a most fitting way to emphasize the appreciation felt by those affected by the mission and ministry begun through the commissions of Our Lady of Good Help.

Please join us in prayer by sending in your needs and intentions during our upcoming Novenas. October 1st through the 9th will be the National Novena of the Shrine followed by our Novena of masses and prayer in preparation for the celebration of the Nativity of the Lord from December 17th to the 25th. Your novena requests and intentions will be remembered each day at the holy sacrifice of the mass. Please unite with us in prayer during our anniversary and Christmas novena's this year.


### October, the Month of Mary and the Rosary

The month of October traditionally dedicated to The Blessed Mother and to the Holy Rosary. Mary's role in the Church is to bring us closer to her Son and the Rosary is a Christocentric setting forth of the entire life of Jesus Christ in His passion, death, resurrection and glory. No form of extra-liturgical devotion to Mary is more widely practiced among the faithful or found by them to be more satisfyingly complete than the Rosary; and rightly so as this devotion comes directly from the hand of the Blessed Virgin Herself.

October 7th marks the feast day of Our Lady of the Rosary. The Church chose that day and, apparently by extension, the month of October to honor Our Lady of the Rosary because of her powerful assistance to those who pray the Rosary. The feast of the Holy Rosary on October 7th celebrates the victory at Lepanto, the battle that saved the Christian West from defeat at the hands of the Ottoman Turks. This day was won, it is believed, because Saint Pope Pius V called on all Christians to pray the Rosary.

The power and importance of the Rosary in the popular piety of the Catholic devotional life must not be underestimated. It has often been referred to as the compendium to the Gospel. Pope Benedict XVI in an address at the Basilica of St. Mary Major said:



Today, together we confirm that the Holy Rosary is not a pious practice banished to the past, like prayers of other times thought of with nostalgia. Instead, the Rosary is experiencing a new Spring time... In the current world, so dispersive, this prayer helps to put Christ at the center, as the Virgin did, who meditated within all that was said about her Son, and also what he did and said.

The best way to celebrate the month of the Holy Rosary is, of course, to pray the rosary. Let us all join together in prayer and devotion to Mary by meditating on the mysteries of our Christian religion contained in the Most Holy Rosary.

### Pilgrimage Corner

The National Shrine of Our Lady of Good Help celebrated the Assumption of the Blessed Mother on August 15th with almost 1200 pilgrims visiting us for the Mass and Rosary procession. In all total for the day was close to 2000 people who visited the Shrine during the day. This is our largest event of the year and is not possible without the grateful help of our Volunteers. Over 100 volunteers were here on August 15th to help facilitate the activities that are necessary to support this event for our pilgrims. From car parkers, hospitality drivers, greeters, lunch preparation, lunch servers, Rosary procession, and flower girls, our volunteers were there with smiles and assistance.

As we look at recapping the year, we are expecting to service about 200 pilgrim groups consisting of 58 Churches, 30 Schools, 60 Religious and 40 Private. We will have hosted 5 major conferences this year with the Diocese Respect for Life, Esto Vir Men of Christ, Order of Malta, Flame of Love and FOCUS National Team Division. We were so grateful to see the students come back this year. Many Faith Formation students are visiting the Shrine prior to making their confirmation.

Two categories that have increased this year are the 37 Catechetical classes with Father Thomas and 18 Parish and School retreats. Father Thomas classes are held on Wednesday night with mass and about 1 ½ hr. class afterwards. His summer classes focused on Mary and her role in the Catholic Church. On an average about 20 people attend

the class. Our Mother of Mercy Hall has been a great asset in accommodating pilgrim retreats. These are generally 1-day retreats for staff members of churches and schools who spend the time talking and praying about their goals for the day and expectations for the coming year. They usually attend Mass and have a lunch as well.

We were also blessed to have two groups come with Bishops from their Diocese and celebrate Mass at the Shrine. Bishop Doherty from Lafayette, IN and his group of 50 came in July. Bishop Hying from Madison, WI traveled with a group of about 80 people including some of the Sisters from the Valley of Our Lady Monastery. They enjoyed the day with Mass, lunch and visiting the sites on the grounds.

#### **December 8**

#### Feast of the Immaculate **Conception of the Virgin Mary** and Declaration

The dogma of the Immaculate Conception was promulgated by Pope Pius IX on December 8, 1854, with the encyclical "Ineffabilis Deus". Four years later, on February 11, 1858, the Virgin Mary appeared to Bernadette Soubirous in Lourdes, France, announcing herself as the Immaculate Conception. It would be a little over one year later, in October 1959, that the Queen of Heaven would appear to young Adele Brise in Robinsonville (now Champion), Wisconsin. 150 years later, on December 8, 2010, Bishop David Ricken of the Diocese of Green Bay would issue the decree approving

the Shrine at Champion as worthy of belief and making it the first Churchapproved apparition site in the United States. Mass for the Feast Day on the 11th anniversary of the Declaration will be celebrated at 11:00am.

## Looking Back...

#### August 15

The weekend of August 15 started with a great talk and a Q&A session with Patrick Madrid. On Sunday, the Feast of the Assumption, close to 2,000 pilgrims visited the Shrine. Bishop David Ricken and many priests concelebrated the Feast Day Mass and led the annual Eucharistic Rosary Procession.

#### September 11

The traditional Nativity of Mary First Harvest Blessing of the Grapes took place following the 11:00am Mass in Mother of Mercy Hall. Afterwards, the Fall Harvest lunch featured Wisconsin booyah, apple donuts and pumpkin bars.

#### October 7, 8 & 9

Thousands of pilgrims visited the Shrine during the final three days of our National Novena. On Thursday, October 7, the Feast of Our Lady of the Rosary and the 450th anniversary of the victory at Lepanto, 1100 people were enrolled in the inaugural enrollment of the Confraternity of the Most Holy Rosary at the National Shrine of Our Lady of Good Help which followed

a Eucharistic Rosary Procession. For those who would like to learn more or enroll in the Confraternity, please visit the "Pray With Us" page on our website.

On October 8, pilgrims attended the annual Miracle of the Fire Memorial which included a reading of the story and a candle-rosary procession around the grounds protected from the Great Fire in 1871. Those attending the all-night Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament were able to participate in hourly rosary processions which included intentions for those who had votive candles placed on the rosary path overnight. This was all part of many memorials that were held in northeastern Wisconsin as part of the 150th anniversary of what's come to be known as the Peshtigo Fire.

On October 9, Bishop David Ricken of the Diocese of Green Bay celebrated the 11:00am Mass on the 162nd anniversary of the last apparition of Our Blessed Mother to Adele in 1859.

### Understanding the Confraternity of the Brown Scapular

The Shrine Gift Shop is inspirational, educational, and sacramentally beneficial. Let us assist you in strengthening your spiritual journey.

"Whoever dies invested with this Scapular shall be preserved from the eternal flames. It is a sign of salvation, a sure safeguard in danger, a pledge of peace and of my special protection until the end of the ages."

Accordina Vatican's to the Congregation for Divine Worship, the Brown Scapular is "an external sign of the filial (dutiful) relationship established between the Blessed Virgin Mary, Mother and Queen of Mount Carmel, and the faithful who entrust themselves totally to her protection, who have recourse to her maternal intercession, who are mindful of the primacy (priority) of the spiritual life and the need for prayer.

#### What is a Confraternity?

A fellowship, society, or community of people. A voluntary group throughout the Catholic Church, in this case, pledged to the lifetime devotion to the Blessed Virgin Mary.

#### What is a Scapular?

The word 'scapular' is derived from the Latin 'scapula', meaning shoulder blade. The scapular originated hundreds of years ago as two large pieces of cloth, attached at the shoulders by narrow strips, which covered the front and back of a monk's habit. Originally worn

to preserve the habit from dirt and wear, it eventually became part of the habit itself. Faith-filled lay people wear a miniature version of the scapular as a sign of special consecration to Our Lady.

#### Why Brown?

Simon Stock, an Englishman, was an early Prior of the Carmelite religious order at a time they were facing serious oppression. As he prayed for heavenly intercession, it is believed that the Blessed Virgin Mary appeared and handed him a Brown Scapular as a special sign of Her favor, saying "... He who dies clothed with this habit, shall be preserved from eternal fire ..." The Brown Scapular is a sacramental sign of devotion to Our Lady of Mt. Carmel, and trust in Her promises for salvation to those who faithfully wear it.

Are you wearing your Brown Scapular? Have you made a commitment to safeguard your salvation? Consider the marvelous privileges our Blessed Lady and the Catholic Church have attached to the wearing of the Brown Scapular.

# What are the requirements for gaining Our Lady's promise of the Brown Scapular?

- Investiture (enrollment) by an ordained priest of the Catholic Church.
- You must properly wear the Scapular over the shoulder so that one part hangs over your chest and the other side hangs over the back. Both parts cannot be carried in the front or the back.
- You must wear a 100%
   wool Scapular, not a medal
   (with very limited exceptions
   – allergy, tropical climate,
   military restrictions).
- Scapular must be rectangular or square. It cannot be oval, round, or polygonal.
- 5. A miniature of the Carmelite Religious Habit, the Scapular color should be brown. However, black wool is permissible.
- 6. You may take your scapular off ONLY when you bathe.
